What can you do to help as a volunteer?

If you have experience with horses, you can spend time grooming, feeding, leading, and handling. Paddocks need to be cleaned, buckets washed, sheds, shelters and fences built or repaired. There is always a lot to do at the Rescue!

If you are not experienced with horses, there are other things you can do to help out Bear Valley Rescue. You can post flyers in your local feed and tack stores, coffee shops and cafes, submit a classified ad to your local paper on our behalf, volunteer at one of our fundraising events, or even take care of some site inspections and adoption follow ups.

Volunteers may assist with picking up of animals, animal intake process, medical treatment and hoof care. In addition to helping with the horses and other animals, we are always in need of help with office and administrative duties.

We could not run our program without the help and support of our volunteers! If you are interested in volunteering, even if you have no experience with large animals, please do not hesitate to contact us. We will try to accommodate your skills, regardless of what they may be. We are truly appreciative of any assistance you can offer!

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY:

I understand that horses are prey animals, independent thinking, living beings, with their own minds, and as such will never be entirely predictable.

I understand that risks exist in all equestrian activities, including risk of permanent disability or death, which common sense and personal awareness may help to reduce.

I am aware that whenever I am a volunteer at BVR it is my responsibility to:

- be alert and respectful of the horses' intentions, signalled with their ears, eyes, body, head, teeth and hooves.
- speak and move in a calm, consistent, and confident way when approaching a horse or horses.
- avoid sudden movements or noises

Follow all orientation directions for approaching and working around the horses:

- **NEVER** leave horses unattended with gates left open, in the barn aisles, while they are tied, while they are in the wash rack or anywhere at any time unless let loose in pastures or paddocks
- always lead horses appropriately and with great attention, holding the lead rope so that it is not looped around any body parts
- always wear appropriate clothing including durable shoes or muck boots
- pick up and replace all tack and equipment used
- know locations of emergency telephones, veterinarian's phone numbers and Bear Valley Rescue contact numbers
- know all fire emergency procedures

- never be intoxicated while on Bear Valley Rescue property or allow others to do so
- no smoking in the barn or sheds

- read and obey all posted information and warnings
- recognize that you are part of a team and respect what all team members have to offer
- when around other team members, be willing to share knowledge/experience; look for opportunities to learn from other team members
- comply promptly with all verbal directions from Bear Valley Rescue staff and volunteer coordinators
- · refrain from acting in any manner which may cause or contribute to injury of self, others, or the horses
- follow the rules of the facility and interact with neighbours and/or other boarders in a friendly and respectful manner

I understand that this is only a partial list, and I must be safety conscious and exercise sound judgement AT ALL TIMES. ANYONE found to be endangering themselves or other people or the horses or other animal residents will face IMMEDIATE revocation of their volunteer privileges WITHOUT EXCEPTION as well as prompt removal from the property.

I understand and agree that submitting this application form does not automatically register me as a Bear Valley Rescue volunteer, and that there may be certain qualifications I must meet; including the acceptance of established volunteer policies and procedures before I may begin volunteering. I also understand that I will be required to sign a waiver before I begin any volunteering. By submitting this form, I attest that the information I have provided on the form is true and accurate.
